

The Downhill Run 2025

After a worrying wet and windy night, a bright morning on 6th July brought runners to Frodsham Hill Memorial for the start of the town's legendary Downhill Run. This year, 206 individuals competed in the 1.3 mile race.

There was a wide age range of runners, from seniors to parents, grandparents to small children. There were supporters all along the route to the finish line in Castle Park, where a crowd cheered their entrance.

The overall winner, with an impressive time of 5 minutes 41 seconds, was 15-year-old Lewis Blake (pictured left), from Halton and Frodsham Harriers, who was ahead of his nearest rival by 23 seconds.

- At the Memory Café

The Memory Café at the Community Church, (known as the Tin Church) on Main Street, came into being about 3 years ago with a couple of members and a core group of volunteers with backgrounds in dementia care, nursing, mental health and social care. There are now about 35 members supported by volunteers providing friendship and a place to belong for people suffering with memory loss, and a lifeline to carers dealing with daily challenges. The Café offers a free service on Wednesdays 10.30-1.30 and covers Frodsham, Helsby and Elton.

VE Day celebrations were in full swing on 7th May with local ukulele group *Ukes on Track* entertaining with music and song, dancing and flag waving along with tea and scones for all. A festive atmosphere surrounded the event, giving a chance for interaction with others and chats to friends and strangers alike. Not every session is a party. Local awarded Freedom of Frodsham

At a Frodsham Town Council meeting on 19th May, Mark O'Sullivan was awarded the Freedom of Frodsham making him a Freeman of the town. The award was in recognition of Mark's exceptional service and dedication during the past eight years in helping to preserve Frodsham's last piece of ancient woodland, Hob Hey Wood, which is now included on the official register of Ancient Woodlands.

Mark formed The Friends of Hob Hey Wood, whose members work with him to clear fallen trees, carry out repairs and protect wildlife in the wood. Mark leads guided walks and monitors the bat population. He also produces an annual calendar filled with his excellent photographs. A wildflower meadow was recently created and the first phase of the path and boardwalk restoration completed. Mark embarked on this project on retirement and credits his wife Julie in supporting him with his work. He continues to liaise with local community groups and organisations and works tirelessly to protect and enhance this important piece of nature.

Health and wellbeing in our community

You may not have heard of the Frodsham, Helsby and Elton Partnership, which is now known as Frodsham, Helsby and Elton Together, but you will undoubtedly be familiar with its contribution to Frodsham.

The Partnership is one of seven in West Cheshire with people from different organisations and services who come together to help improve the health and wellbeing of our community. It is unique in having for the past two years, Iris Keating, as its Chair in a voluntary rather than professional role.

One of the most well known activities that was seed funded by the Partnership is Frodsham Bee Friends, the Thursday morning drop in at the Parish hall in Church Street where hot drinks and biscuits are served to anyone seeking lively conversation and companionship. Other initiatives include The Memory Café at Main Street Community Church, (see article) STAR, a bereavement peer support group, and "Meet and Eat" a more recent project bringing together men who are living alone to connect, learn basic cooking skills and enjoy eating together.

Plastic: Solution or Pollution?

Plastic, invented in 1907, was thought to be the solution to everything, but is it the solution or is it just pollution? Pupils and staff at Frodsham CE Primary School have been trying to answer this question.

After half term, we were shocked to find our playground engulfed in plastic. We realised it was part of a project to teach us about ocean pollution.

On 4th of June, the whole school visited Blue Planet Aquarium. Some of our favourite parts were travelling through the glass tunnel and seeing the beautiful fish; but we also learned about how plastic pollution affects sharks.

We share our concerns with our link school on the Soloman Islands. Mrs Kirby, Headteacher said, "We want our children to go out and make a real difference in the world. Many are already passionate about protecting the environment. Through our project on plastic pollution and the damage to the oceans, we

hope they will think carefully about their choices but will also persuade others to reduce, reuse and recycle."

Each class is focused on a specific marine animal; Year 6 are learning about manta rays. They consume microplastics (bio-persistent particles that come from larger pieces of plastic) and are in danger. Fish cannot adapt to eating microplastic.

A year 6 pupil said, "Plastic pollution is affecting our area. Animals are eating microplastics every day and it makes me upset."
Humans also consume 50,000 microplastic particles each year. An Art Exhibition was staged for public viewing on 1st and 2nd of July.

Her dad was a coach and Jane got into the game at uni and the sport remains a great passion with her family. Though considered a winter activity, the club trains all year and in good weather can be found at the cricket pitch in Frodsham or even at Formby beach.

Jane coaches for GCSE at Helsby High and the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme at the school and at the Youth Club. The club enters league and national competitions.

At the moment, the club is ranked 20th for the England Boys team and 38th in the Girls team; a considerable achievement.

Inspectors praise Frodsham school's journey of improvement

Frodsham Primary Academy's three-year journey of improvement has been recognised by Ofsted inspectors who have rated it good for the quality of education, behaviour and the attitudes of its children and its early years provision. Leadership, management and personal development were rated outstanding.

The inspectors noted "Leaders, including representatives of the trust (Warrington Primary Academy WAPT), have been highly successful in turning the fortunes of this school around. As a result, pupils enjoy a good quality of education. For example, in 2024, the proportion of pupils achieving the expected standard in reading,

writing and mathematics in Year 6 was above the national average." Head of School Gemma Callaghan

said: "I am incredibly proud of the journey we have undertaken. Over the past three years our staff have worked tirelessly to enhance outcomes for the children in our school.

Our students and community deserve high-quality education that equips children for lifelong learning. We take great pride in the educational

opportunities we provide and are pleased that these efforts have been recognised".

Swing Bridge repairs

A statement has been released by Councillor Mike Garvey which will be a relief to many. Vital works from 16th June until October will be carried out away from the highway and will create no disruption to traffic or pedestrians. From 27th October work will be done overnight for two weeks from 7.00pm to 6.30am for works on the barrier. This will require a lane closure and temporary traffic lights. Cheshire West and Chester Council have worked with The Rivers and Canals Trust after strong concerns from the community over the initial proposals.

The Trust will give updates about further testing next year as the bridge celebrates its Centenary Year.

Constituency News

On 1st May 2025 residents in the Runcorn and Helsby constituency (which includes Frodsham) voted in a by election to select their MP.

From 13 candidates, the result was the closest ever seen in a by election with Sarah Pochin of Reform UK receiving just 6 votes more than Labour's Karen Shore. There were 85 spoiled ballot sheets.

Although the constituency has 70,621 people eligible to vote, only 32,655 constituents turned out, which was a 13.57% drop from the vote at the General Election.

Main Street Café host local celebrity

Weaver Words Literary Festival enjoyed another successful week with many famous writers appearing. Main Street Café hosted a dinner where local writer and Weaver Words Patron, Tim Firth, (Kinky Boots, Calendar Girls), gave a talk on his life and work. Owners Lucy and Abe Geldenhuys were also involved with the Festival of Walks and contribute to local schools and charities and love being part of the Frodsham community after lives and successful careers spanning South Africa, London and Cheshire. In 2020 they bought the former HSBC bank building and spent many hours during lockdown designing and regenerating it with mainly local trades, into the now beautiful restaurant.

Lucy, a Cordon Bleu chef, trained a close-knit team that prepares freshly made food, from breads and pizza dough to salad dressings and puddings. All-day dining is

offered from breakfast, through lunch to dinner. There is a rear secret garden which can cater for parties and is a quiet oasis. The restaurant employs a hard working and loyal local staff of 20, with a full-time core and several young part-timers starting their employment journey. And if you want to spend a penny? Take a look on your left before the curtain – the door to the Bank vault is now an art work.

Frodsham Solar Project

The Frodsham Solar project has reached a key milestone with the submission of an application for a Development Consent Order to the Planning Inspectorate on 30th May 2025.

Located on Frodsham Marsh and being developed by Cubico Sustainable Investments, the solar farm would deliver enough home-grown clean electricity to power around 40,000 homes. The proposals include a battery system that's capable of storing the electricity and supplying it later when the power is needed most, as well as having provision for the supply of renewable electricity direct to local industry. The project will respond to the Climate Emergency declared by Cheshire West and Chester Council and create employment

opportunities during its construction. Over its operational life, the project would provide millions of pounds of funding to support community initiatives in the local area.

Public access and recreational opportunities will improve with new paths proposed across the site. Biodiversity will be boosted through extensive planting of hedgerows and trees, in addition to ambitious plans to create a wetland habitat to support birds and other wildlife. It's anticipated that the project will provide an important educational resource for local schools and universities.
