
Frodsham's International Children's Writer

A university summer break at Camp America started Iryna Garkusha's journey to England when she made friends with a Frodsham lass.

Back in her native Ukraine, she fled the ruins of Donetsk, settled in Kyiv and when the Russians invaded in 2022, she was married with two small children. She had published her first book in 2020 which covered the dangers of sexting for primary school children. This sold over 20,000 copies and she quickly became well known. She followed this up with a book about dreams.

Her friend, Suzy, offered refuge and the family made their way to Frodsham. Since arriving, Iryna has made quite an impact. With her husband resuming his career and her children in a local school, she spends her time writing, mentoring other writers, reading in schools, delivering workshops including Weaver Words and on the "Danny" steam ship as well as singing in church.

Her third published book is in English and deals with a dinosaur giving and asking for help and is dedicated to the people of Frodsham for their kindness and welcome to our community. 100 years of Runcorn Sea Cadets T/A (Training Ship) Ashanti

The Cadets celebrated our 100 year anniversary in September and marked this huge milestone with a traditional Navy Mess dinner at the Forest Hills Hotel. Many volunteers attended from as far back as 1959 but who still support and attend activities and share memories. We are celebrating our anniversary as part of a national network, working with units in Chester, Ellesmere Port, Widnes and Warrington.

The youth organization follows Navy guidelines although an independent charity who do their own fundraising. Over the years volunteers both uniformed and non uniformed have given their time to the cadets providing first aid training, camping trips, visits to naval ships and running the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme plus other classes designed to give inner confidence, personal self belief and development. We serve the community by selling poppies and parading on remembrance days.

Water based activities from April to October include rowing, paddle boarding and kayaking at our boating station on the River Weaver, near Frodsham swing bridge and power boating in Colwyn Bay. We parade on Monday and Thursday evenings at our HO at Army Reserve Centre, Crown Gate,

For many, Scouting is a memorable part of childhood, with outdoor activities, water sports and fun in the Hut forging life-long hobbies and friendships. Now, children do not have to wait until they are six to get involved but can become a Squirrel Scout from age four.

Launched in 2021, the programme was designed for pre-school children to learn new skills, make friends and unlock hidden talents. The 3rd Frodsham Squirrels started in February 2025 and there are currently 12 Squirrels enrolled, most of whom have already earned at least 9 badges!

The carefully planned curriculum consists of 12 'Activity Badges', covering cooking, safety and creativity, and 4 'Challenge Awards', themed on teamwork, citizenship, personal development, outdoors and adventure. When a Squirrel has earned all Challenge Awards and two Activity Badges, they will gain the 'Chief Scout's Acorn Award', which is the highest award a Squirrel can earn – a huge achievement!

Previous activities at 3rd Frodsham include a treasure hunt and campfire at Queen Charlotte's Wood, canoeing on the River Weaver, crafts and den-building. Upcoming events include a Halloween party, Bonfire Night celebrations, a special guest visit from PCSO Neil Flanagan and Bouldering at the Ellesmere Port climbing hut.

Proposed new housing development

At an extraordinary meeting of Frodsham Town Council on 1st September 2025, a planning application for a new housing development of 91 dwellings on land opposite Castle Park with proposed access from the A56, was discussed. Twenty-four residents attended the meeting In Castle Park Arts Centre. Four people raised points including building on land that is designated "Green Belt", increased traffic

congestion, especially at peak times and when accidents impact on the M56, increased pressure on overstretched infrastructure and concern about the potential loss of or damage to heritage assets.

Frodsham Town Council has stated in the minutes that it does not support or object to the application 25/02109/FUL, however, it has highlighted three priority concerns in its response to CWAC. Details of the response can be read at www.frodsham.gov.uk under meeting, Events Committee.


Local hero retires from Frodsham Library

After serving 46 years with the Library Service, Jenny Evans, Senior Customer Service Rep retired on 4th October. She is a well known and very popular member of the community, welcoming and assisting locals with her knowledge and warm and cheery approach.

A Library can be more than a place that lends books; it can get everyone involved. It can order books, photocopy, accommodate research and supply work stations, be a place to join reading and writing groups or renew a bus pass. As Jen says, story time and choosing books to borrow can lead children to a "world of imagination". In 2021, Jen achieved national acclaim from Unison when she was named Local Service Champion from 800 applicants from local authority staff for transforming the Library into a community hub welcoming everyone.

Jen has loved her career with the Library Service and has very mixed feelings about retiring. She and her husband intend to travel and undertake another transformation – this time, in their garden. She will be very much missed by the residents of Frodsham who wish her happiness in her retirement.





Frodsham Market - Tradition Not Trend

Frodsham's market status dates back to 1279 when King Edward I granted rights to a weekly market and two annual Fairs. The market eventually lapsed, but was re-established in 1661.

Trade has evolved from the herding of animals to selling exotic fruits in the 1960s and to the purchase of the Market Charter in 1975 by the present custodians, the Don family.

The market saw coach loads of visitors in the 1980s through to lockdown in 2020 to Jeanette Don's (Northern Markets) care and respect for the markets special heritage from 2024.

Jeanette's sense of family runs deep with the market as Frodsham is a second home to her. The manager and long term traders have worked hard since the pandemic to revive the market and remind us of the importance of our shared history, 'family' connection and community on Thursdays. The town is so fortunate to have a thriving and varied traditional market. History continues in this special place for us all to browse, purchase and meet up with friends, family and strangers.

Picnic in the Park

On the 23rd August this new and FREE event was held in Castle Park thanks to Frodsham Town Council Events Committee and volunteers. The weather held and attendance was excellent with many families relaxing with picnics all over the park. Children enjoyed bouncy castles, a helter skelter and face paints and thanks go to Tin Can Alley for providing traditional fair games which were very busy all afternoon. The school were delighted to report on results day 21st August that students performed strongly across all areas of the school's curriculum, with over $\frac{3}{4}$ of all students achieving a Grade 4 or above in English and in Maths. Equally impressive was performance at higher grades, with over $\frac{1}{2}$ of the year group achieving a 'strong' GCSE pass of Grade 5 or above in both key subject areas and 14 students achieving the top grade 9, in at least one of their subjects.

Head teacher Martin Hill said: "Year 11 students first joined the school in 2020, at the height of the pandemic, so couldn't have had a more difficult start to secondary school life. Hence seeing them 5 years later achieve so well in their examinations is particularly special.

Natalie Witcher, their Year Leader commented: "We couldn't be more proud of our Year 11 students and their achievements. We now wish this fantastic group of young people all the very best for the future as they move on to their exciting next steps and we are really looking forward to having the pleasure of continuing to work with many of them in our Sixth Form."
